Dear Good People of Briarcliff Church,

Earlier this year, I invoked my retiring pastor's privilege and included a copy of a "thank you" sermon I'd preached earlier that month in an edition of *The Open Door*. I wanted a wider hearing for that sermon than that in any particular Sunday congregation; because in the sermon I tried to express my profound appreciation for and to this parish. In the end, it will be thirteen years of blessed and precious ministry, I've shared here, with you in Christ. That's something for which to be thankful! I hope you were able to read that message of gratitude last fall and to sense from it just how full of thanks my heart is for these grace-filled and many seasons of serving God and BCC.

Among other things in that sermon last fall, I self-identified as someone who "wears her heart on her sleeve." I find that heart is on my sleeve a bit again this month, as well; as the anticipatory losses of retirement are informed by both the themes of Lent and Easter and the truths they proclaim.

While I am and continue to be full of gratitude for my pastorate with BCC, I am also full of sorrow as I anticipate saying, "Good-bye." Being a sentimental sop, I'm living this year mindful of what is a series of "lasts:" My last Christmas Eve, my last Transformation Sunday, my last Easter, and so forth and so on. Believe me, I look forward to retirement, I really, really do! And, to be honest, I rejoice in some of the lasts, for sure. But, believe me, also: I live with a sense of looming loss. Time is fast approaching when I'll no longer be either *a* or *your* pastor.

It's not much of a stretch to apply the themes of late Lent and Easter (dying and rising) to these circumstances. Inevitably, I will have to "die" to my pastor's identity. As threatening as this idea is, I know by faith that in God's time I'll be "raised" to a new purposefulness, even after the covenants of my formal ministry are dissolved. And, you, too, dear congregation: In so far as any of you might be experiencing loss in my retirement, be assured you, too, will be raised to new life as you celebrate the promise of my successor's ministry with you in this place.

The rhythms of death and resurrection inform our whole lives. How else could we bear the many losses we suffer every day – even those so natural as pastors coming and going? HOLY WEEK AND EASTER

Our observation of Holy Week and Easter '17 will reflect our pattern of the last several years. **Palm**

Sunday, 9 April, will be observed with palms, the traditional hymns for the day, and reflections on the Gospel account of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem (according to John this year). The choir will sing "Domine Fili unigenite" from Vivaldi's "Gloria."

On **Maundy Thursday**, the Pastor and Board of Deacons will be offering worship, beginning at 7:30, which will include a celebration of the Last Supper, a *Pedilavium* (foot-washing) and a *Tenebrae* (gathering shadows). This service concludes in silence and in the dark, and for many, is the "favorite service of the year."

Easter Sunday will find us gathering **twice** to celebrate Jesus' resurrection: At 9:30 and again at 11:00. The first service, intended to include our children, will be shorter and will feature a rite of "flowering the cross." The Cherub Choir will sing. Later, at 11AM, a more traditional celebration of Easter will be offered. The 11:00 liturgy will be enhanced by a string quartet and choral music from Vivaldi's "Gloria." The *Overture* from Handel's *Messiah* will be offered as the Prelude for both services; and, Fimi will conclude both with Widor's "Toccata" as Postlude. 'Twill be sublime.

NEWS FROM THE PASTORAL SEARCH COMMITTEE

On Sunday, March 5, BCC was honored to have Rev. Dr. Marsha Williams as a guest preacher during worship. Rev. Williams, an Associate Conference Minister of the New York Conference of the UCC, is guiding us through our pastoral search process, and we are blessed and grateful to have her help.

Now that our job posting is listed on the UCC's website, (as of March 1st), we have begun to receive a number of candidate profiles. Each member of our committee is thoughtfully and prayerfully considering each candidate to determine who will receive a copy of our Church Profile and subsequently who will be invited for an initial interview via Skype. We also will request from candidates who receive a copy of our Church Profile a cover letter containing a brief description of why they would like to be considered for the position and of anything they read in our Church Profile that aroused their interest. In addition, if available, we will review candidates' websites, video/audio recordings of past sermons, blogs and other online material. Following our initial Skype interviews, we will discuss and decide which candidates we would like to move further along in the interview process and the appropriate way to do so (whether it be a second Skype interview with additional members of our committee, a trip to see them preach in their own church, or setting up a neutral pulpit closer to home).

SUNDAY SCHOOL CELEBRATES

PALM SUNDAY WITH A SEDER

The Sunday School will hold a Seder on Palm Sunday in BeeBe Hall after Bonnie's Children's Moment.

The Jewish people celebrate their freedom from slavery and bondage at the hands of the Egyptians thousands of years by holding the Seder, a ritual Jewish feast to mark the beginning of Passover.

In Exodus 12 Moses said, "Let my people go" and Pharaoh said "No" and God sends ten plagues to Egypt to make Pharaoh listen. The Jews suffered the first nine plagues but not the 10th. The Sunday School will read the story of Passover from Exodus at the Seder table in BeeBe Hall. Then the children will read from Isaiah and Luke to learn how Jesus celebrated the Passover and the story the story of the Last Supper.

CONFIRMATION CLASS MAKES

HEADWAY

Pastor Bonnie has been meeting with four of our young people (Hallie Foss, Emma Konrad, Caroline Adams and Matt Stewart), preparing for the Rite of Confirmation, which is scheduled for 4 June. Class content is organized this year around what is known as "the religious quadrilateral," an understanding of our faith as being revealed in and built on four foundations: Scripture, Tradition, Community and Experience. John Wesley first formulated this methodology for faith reflection, but it's been adapted and fine tuned by others, as well. With it in mind, we're reviewing the story of salvation history, as put forward in our Scriptures; we'll be looking at the Ancient Creeds

and tracing them to contemporary Statements of Faith; we'll be talking with members of the BCC community about the role of faith in their adult lives; and we'll be developing our own credos, drawing on our own life/faith experiences. It's a demanding curriculum and a lot to ask of our confirmands-to-be! So, please keep the Confirmation Group (and Pastor Bonnie!) in your prayers.

EMERGENCY SHELTER UPDATE

BCC hosted the Ossining Emergency Shelter for a second week, March 12-18, which included some special provision for shelter during Storm Stella! Our guests were stranded here on the 14th, sheltering in place while the storm raged. And what a blessing it was for them to be warm, safe, fed, dry and undisturbed! Some were able to sleep most of the day, catching up on rest that's constantly interrupted by the predictable and many dislocations of being homeless.

Thank you, Judy Beck, for organizing our volunteers; thank you, volunteers, for pitching in and helping out; and thank you, BCC cooks, for feeding our guests so handsomely and well. Thank you, too, Yasna, for helping keep disruptions to a minimum.

Last year the Shelter offered three weeks of hospitality, all at Trinity Episcopal Church in Ossining. At that time, four Ossining/Briarcliff faith communities were involved. This year, we will have offered fourteen weeks of shelter in nine different sites by the time we close. Nine faith communities, including two in Croton, will have participated. That's quite a developmental leap! Who knows what winter '18 will produce...
